COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will deal with media semiotics, both in the traditional sense of **the study of meanings in all media (from print to digital)** and in **how new digital media are changing the nature of signification and communication.** The course will look at the usage of semiotics to study how meaning is negotiated in interactive (*emergent*) media **versus** the older and still extant one-way (*legacy*) **media** (*print and radio*, for example). The course will utilize actual media materials (*comic books*, *television programs*, *text messages*, and so on) on which semiotic analysis can be conducted.

Assignments
